
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Dear OMTA Colleagues,

Dr. E. L. Lancaster is Vice President and Kevboard Editor-in-Chief of Alfred Music Publishing. He holds degrees from Murray (KY) State University, the University of Illinois, and a Ph.D. from Northwestern.

He was a Professor of Music at the University of Oklahoma (1979-1998), where he taught courses in piano pedagogy and coordinated the group piano program. Dr. Lancaster

established the masters and doctoral programs in piano pedagogy at the University of Oklahoma in 1980 and served as Major Professor for more than 50 doctoral dissertations in that field. He taught pre-college students in the Piano Pedagogy Laboratory Program, combining group and private instruction. In addition, from 1981 to 1996, he and his wife, Dr. Gayle Kowalchyk, operated a large independent piano studio in Norman, Oklahoma.

Dr. Lancaster has served as National Chairman of Group Piano and National Chairman of Student Chapters for MTNA, as well as held offices in the National Conference on Piano Pedagogy, including Chair of the Administration/Pedagogy Liaison Committee. He has received numerous teaching awards from the University of Oklahoma, including the Regents Award for Superior Teaching (1984), Associated Distinguished Lectureship (1987), Provost's Outstanding Academic Advising Award (1996), and Outstanding Faculty Award in the College of Fine Arts (1996). In 1991 he was awarded a David Ross Boyd Professorship, named in honor of the first OU president, given to faculty members who excel in teaching, counseling and guiding students.

Dr. Lancaster has presented workshops for teachers throughout the United States, Canada, Hong Kong, China, Korea, Malaysia, Singapore and Thailand. He is the author or co-author of more than 350 publications designed for students of all ages. He now lives in the Los Angeles area with his wife and their two children, Kelsey and Chase.





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
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



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Dr. Gayle Kowalchyk Conference Clinician

Gayle Kowalchyk is currently a Senior Keyboard Editor for Supplementary Piano Publications for Alfred Music Publishing. She holds degrees from Ohio University (piano performance), Northwestern University (piano performance and pedagogy, 1979) and an Ed.D. from Teachers College, Columbia University



(piano pedagogy, 1989). Formerly on the faculty of Eastern Illinois University, she coordinated the class piano program, directed the piano preparatory program, and taught graduate piano pedagogy. During the summers of 1979-1982 she taught class piano and piano ensemble at the National Music Camp in Interlochen, Michigan. She has also taught piano pedagogy and class piano at Oklahoma Baptist University and the University of Oklahoma.

As clinician and adjudicator, Dr. Kowalchyk has presented sessions for national conventions of MTNA and the Music Educators National Conference, as well as for the National Group Piano Symposium, the National Piano Teachers Institute, the International Pedagogy Workshops, the National Conference on Piano Pedagogy and the World Piano Pedagogy Conference.

With her husband, Dr. E. L. Lancaster, she is the co-author of more than 275 educational piano books, including Alfred's *Premier Piano Course*, which they have co-authored with Dennis Alexander, Victoria McArthur, and Martha Mier.

From 1981 until 1996 Dr. Kowalchyk and her husband taught students of all ages at their independent piano studio in Norman, Oklahoma. They now live in the Los Angeles area with their two children, where she works full-time on writing and editing projects for Alfred.

Kris Maloy Commissioned Composer



Kris Maloy, an active saxophonist, has been a featured performer in both classical and jazz settings. In 1997 and 1999, he received Outstanding Individual Achievement Awards in Jazz from the National Association of Jazz Educators for featured performances at the Wichita Jazz Festival. His performances have also been featured at the Society of

Composers conferences and the North American Saxophone Alliance International Conference.

As an eclectic composer of many interests and influences, his music bridges many styles and genres. It has been described as "of great elegance...expansively lyrical" (David LaMarche, New York Concert Review) and "beautifully paced". His work has received honors and awards in music composition from the American Composers Forum, the North American Saxophone Alliance, the Society of Composers, and ASCAP. Recent commissions include Quartet in Four Actions for the chamber music group BrightMusic (recently performed at Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall), and White Heat for the University of Central Oklahoma (UCO) Jazz Orchestra. He has recently been awarded artist residencies at the Banff Centre for the Arts in Alberta, Canada, and the Ucross Foundation arts colony in Wyoming. His next major commissioned work in progress is a double concerto for two violins and orchestra to be premiered in 2013.

He holds degrees in music composition from Oklahoma City University, Bowling Green State University, and University of Texas at Austin. He has studied composition with Donald Grantham, Kevin Puts, Marilyn Shrude, Edward Knight, and Mikel Kuehn. Currently, he teaches at the Bass School of Music at Oklahoma City University, UCO, and UCO's Jazz Lab. He is an instructor in composition, jazz and commercial arranging, orchestration, improvisation, songwriting, saxophone, music theory, and aural skills.

Prologue (Organum)

- I. Perception (flowing through a curved lens)
- II. Memory (a broken glass shatters back together)
- III. Convergence (from the synthesis of past and future, the present emerges)

Epilogue: The Persistent Illusion of Time

I have become fascinated in recent years by the idea of time and the scientific studies that continue to unravel only deeper levels of mystery about the nature of time. Once thought to be an unvielding and constant measure, time was displaced by relativity theory as being bendable and subject to gravity. Contemporary studies in physics seem to indicate that at the smallest and most fundamental levels of the universe, paths that will be taken in the future effect the paths of the past, rendering any perception of causality empty. Most recent thinking on the nature of time suggests that the very concept of time may arise with our consciousness, proposing the (somewhat unsettling!) idea that a key component on which we base our experience of the world is simply an apparition. This gives aphorisms about watched pots never boiling, watched clocks never ticking, and time flying when you're having fun a whole new meaning! It also leads to the further unsettling idea that anything and everything we perceive may have no basis in any objective "reality" and that there is only our perception.

This piece is a reflection and meditation on these thoughts. This work is constructed on a set of interval cycles that is established in the Prologue through an imitative melody on a constant rhythm. Here, an homage to organum reflects the idea of humans—through all but the most recent history of time—as the constant of the universe. ("Organum" is a centuries-old musical genre that focused on a consistent mode of rhythm and the "perfect" intervals of 4ths, 5ths, and octaves.)

Movement I focuses on time as linear, but warped and inconstant—flowing forward, but faster, slower, and blurred. Movement II allows the musical materials on which the piece is built to flow backwards just as, at a level we can not perceive in the universe, the future seems equally likely to flow toward the past. Movement III is constructed from the fundamental musical material overlapped onto itself, rendering the passage of time a vacant concept.

Finally, in the Epilogue, the original opening melody recurs again, but accompanied now by the overlapped beginning and ending of the cyclical musical materials, signifying the idea that though our perception goes on as it ever has, it goes on with the knowledge that the progressive passage of time may be nothing but illusion.

Dr. Barbara Fast, Frieda
Derdeyn Professor of Piano,
Professor of Piano Pedagogy and Piano Area Chair,
coordinates the group

Irene and Julian Rothbaum
Presidential Professor of
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OU, she co-founded the National Group Piano/Piano Pedagogy Forum held for the first time in 2000. The biennial event will occur in 2014 Cincinnati Conservatory of Music (CCM). She also served on the Editorial Board of the MTNA E-Journal, and as Associate Editor of Piano Pedagogy Forum, the first keyboard journal on the WEB.

Currently, she serves as President-Elect of the Oklahoma Music Teachers Association (OMTA). She has presented numerous workshops on practicing, sight reading, ensemble music, technology, newly published music, and historical keyboard pedagogy at the London International Piano Symposium (2013), Music Teachers National Conferences (MTNA), The Hawaii International Conference on Arts and Humanities, International and National College Music Society Conferences (CMS), the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy (NCKP), World Piano Pedagogy Conferences (WPPC), and the European Piano Teachers Conference (EPTA). She has served on numerous national and state MTNA and NCKP piano pedagogy related positions. Additionally she has performed in chamber settings in England, Russia, and Japan as well as presented lecture recitals and master classes throughout the United States.



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

Spark Talk! Dr. Edward Gates Solving "Hard Spots" in Lower-Advanced Literature



Don't "work on" a hard spot, solve it. Don't get through it, make it wonderful. Don't overcome it, make it EASY. What is EASY? How do I apply EASY to hard spots?

Dr. Edward Gates teaches undergraduate and graduate applied piano, as well as selected graduate seminars in

piano literature. Hailed as "a splendid pianist" by *The New York Times*, he has performed in solo recitals and chamber concerts throughout the United States. He has been guest soloist with orchestras under such conductors as Robert Shaw, Guy Fraser Harrison, and Luis Herrara. He studied at Oberlin Conservatory of Music, Indiana University, the Mozarteum Akademie in Salzburg, and the Hochschule für Musik in Vienna. In 1971 he received a Fulbright grant to do research on Eighteenth Century pianos at the Kunsthistorisches Museum in Vienna. In 1992 he was invited to give recitals, lectures, and master classes in Taiwan and the People's Republic of China.

He has received the University of Oklahoma Regents' Award for Superior Teaching and the Burlington Northern Award for Faculty Achievement. In 1997 he was named the Irene and Julian J. Rothbaum Presidential Professor of Excellence in the Arts.

Dr. Edward Gates received his Bachelor of Music from Oberlin Conservatory of Music, and his Masters of Music and Doctorate of Musical Arts from Indiana University.

Alan Chow Guest Artist



Alan Chow, acclaimed for his "elegant poetry and virtuosic fire," has won First Prize in the Concert Artists Guild International Competition, the UCLA International Piano Competition, and the Palm Beach Invitational International Piano Competition. A Steinway artist, Professor Chow has performed in concert with orchestras in 45 states including the National Symphony, Tulsa Philharmonic, Kansas

City Symphony, and Omaha Symphony. He regularly tours Asia with performances in China, Japan, Hong Kong, Taiwan, and Singapore. An avid chamber musician, he has collaborated with the American, Pacifica, and Miami String Quartets and has been guest artist at the Grand Canyon Chamber Music Festival, Juneau Jazz and Classics, and Texas Music Festival. He also appears in joint recital engagements in the Cheng-Chow Trio with pianists Angela Cheng and Alvin Chow.

Also in demand for his teaching, he is currently coordinator of the piano program at Northwestern University in Chicago. Professor Chow has given master classes throughout North America and Asia at conservatories, universities, and summer festivals. Appointed guest professor at the Central Conservatory in Beijing and honored visiting professor at the Shenyang Conservatory, he has presented recitals, master classes, and lectures in China at the conservatories in Shanghai, Chengdu, Xian, and Wuhan.

He studied with Nelita True at the University of Maryland where he received the Charles Manning Prize in the Creative and Performing Arts; Sascha Gorodnitzki at The Juilliard School where he was awarded the Victor Herbert Prize in Piano; and Menahem Pressler at Indiana University where he was the recipient of the Joseph Battista Memorial Scholarship. 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
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Spark Talk! OUI Collegiate Session

Teaching Accompanying Skills to Piano Students

Everyone appreciates a great accompanist! This session explores the many ways that teachers can begin to develop often-overlooked collaborative skills in students of all ages through the use of technology and appropriate teaching literature.

This presentation will illustrate how the use of technologies such as iPads, smart phones and laptops and the use of applications such as Skype, Trail-Mix and Home Concert Xtreme can be used to develop collaborative skills in piano students. These devices can help students focus on their collaborative playing outside of the lesson and are a fun and exciting way to reinforce basic skills.

Portions of this session were used for a 45-minute presentation at the MTNA National Conference in Anaheim California this past March. Presenters at the national conference included Rebecca Calvert, Olivia Ellis, Nicole Thompson, Cindy Tseng, Joan Wallace and Thomas White.

The OU MTNA Collegiate Chapter has been an active student chapter both locally and nationally. In addition to this year's March 2013 national conference presentation, the OU collegiate chapter also presented at the 2011 MTNA national conference in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, with the University of Michigan Collegiate Chapter on "Liszt for the Advancing High School Pianist". The OU collegiate chapter received Student Chapter of the Year awards in 2007 and 2009 for outstanding service in the music community. 


