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


Matthew Saunders Commissioned Composer



Matthew C. Saunders (b. 1976) has taught music from kindergarten to college in styles from madrigal to mariachi, and strives to make beautiful music for and with captivating people. He has climbed mountains, saved someone's life, and watched the moon rise over the prairie. He has loved, lost, and loved again; helped friends find salvation, and found it for himself as well; taught genius students, and

learned from genius teachers. On the day his son Noah was born, he gave him his first shampoo, and looks forward to teaching him to catch a baseball and ride a bicycle sometime around 2015. His dreams are to walk on Mars, hear a grand piano fall into an orchestra pit, make more people laugh than cry, and love his wife Becky passionately and forever. He plays trombone and is always getting better at playing piano, and in the course of a long, love-filled, productive life, he wants to compose the Great American Symphony, ride the rails, hike the trails, read all of the good books, finally watch *The Godfather*, and storm the castles in the air. He will never write unlistenable music, stop stargazing, or lose money in Vegas. He doesn't call his mother often enough, but still tries to do a good turn daily. He is always up for a few hands of euchre or a good game of chess, likely winning the former and losing the latter.

Dr. Saunders is Assistant Professor of Music at Oklahoma Panhandle State University, where he teaches music theory, composition and instrumental music. He received degrees in music from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music and The Ohio State University. His music has been performed across the country, and he has presented his research on rhythm at conferences of the College Music Society and the Society of Composers. He received the 2007 Ruth Friscoe Prize for composition and is the Oklahoma Music Teachers Association 2011 Commissioned Composer. His works include music for solo instruments, chamber ensembles, voices, band and orchestra, and his upcoming projects feature concerti or guitarist Petar Jankovic and clarinetist Magie Smith and a suite for string orchestra. He is on the web at www.martiandances.com, but the physical Dr. Saunders lives in Guymon, Oklahoma, with his wife Becky and their son Noah.



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Piano Sonata (2010)

Commissioned Work by Matthew Saunders

Piano Sonata (2010) is my first extended composition for solo piano. Its single movement explores most of the influences and techniques that I have come to consider integral to my style at the end of the first decade of the new millennium while also pushing toward a mastery of longer musical forms; it is my longest single movement to date. This work adheres to no standard formal plan, taking the name *Sonata* in the broad sense of a major artistic statement for a solo instrument. While I had intended from the first to fulfill the OMTA's commission with a piano sonata, like most of my music, this piece did not really begin to take shape until I was able to conceive of it with a specific performer in mind, in this case, Dr. Dianna Anderson of Minot State University. Dianna and I first met in 1996 when she was a graduate student at the University of Cincinnati and I was assigned to her studio for elective piano lessons. After we reconnected through Facebook about ten years later, Dianna agreed to premiere my piano cycle Starry Wanderers on a faculty recital in Minot in 2009. Her approach to my music and the techniques it requires were flawless, and when we were able to spend time together, I was reminded how similar we are in outlook and personality. Our artistic partnership has been a boon to my work and is a model for the way I hope to create in the future.

The Piano Sonata is constructed around a family of chords that is built of stacks of sevenths, and consciously visits the various registers and tone colors of the piano in succession. My music is largely rhythmic in its conception, and this piece is no exception to that rule, employing mixed meters, asymmetrical meter and rhythmic structures borrowed from ragtime and jazz in addition to a section in what I have termed "quintuplous meter," or music with five notes to every beat. More important, however, are a series of images (in no particular order): driving into the Sangre de Cristo Mountains on U.S. 64 in New Mexico; the stars on a clear winter's night in the Texas Panhandle; the Oklahoma City National Memorial on a quiet Sunday morning; the Olympic Mountains of Washington at sunset; my infant son asleep in my arms. The reverence and awe, sometimes bordering on vertigo, of these images provides the core compositional motivation for this piece.

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Dianna Anderson Commissioned Work Performer



Pianist **Dianna Anderson** is on faculty at Minot State University, Minot, North Dakota, where she serves as an instructor of piano and theory. In addition to teaching, she maintains an active career as a performer. Her solo repertoire ranges from Bach to the present day with a special affinity for the music of Beethoven, Debussy, and Ravel. She

is currently pursuing a cycle of all thirty-two Beethoven Piano Sonatas. She has an interest in promoting new music, and has premiered works by Matthew Saunders and Robert Bradshaw. As a founding member of the piano trio, Luminus, and in collaboration with numerous instrumentalists and vocalists, she performs frequently in the chamber music setting. Anderson is especially interested in promoting the art of chamber music to young people throughout the Plains region, and with Luminus, has performed for and worked with hundreds of high-school music students. She is on faculty at Dakota Chamber Music and International Music Camp. Her degrees are from University of Idaho with Jay Mauchley, and Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music with Frank Weinstock.

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David Forbat College Faculty Forum

A member of the UCO piano faculty since 2005, **David Forbat** teaches applied piano, piano ensemble, and group piano. He holds a DMA from the Peabody Institute of the Johns Hopkins University, a MM from the University of Cincinnati, College-Conservatory of Music and a BM from the University of Southern California. His teachers included John Perry, Frank Weinstock, Claude Frank and Ann Schein. Prior to 2005, he held full-time



teaching appointments at Geneva College (PA) and William Carey College (MS) and part-time appointments at the University of Pittsburgh and Carnegie Mellon University (PA).

Dr. Forbat maintains an active performing schedule as both solo and collaborative pianist. Aside from traditional recitals, he has presented informative and cross-disciplinary programs entitled "Liszt and the Italian Poets," "The French Connection" and "Schumann's Carnaval, Op.9." His most recent interdisciplinary project took place during the Spring 2011 semester – a collaboration with UCO Department of Dance in performances of Three Novelettes by Francis Poulenc.

With Jacquelyn Karash, NCTM, he continues to explore the integration of keyboard learning with moveable-DO solfège. On this topic, he presented the CFF session at the 2007 OMTA State Convention. For the 2011 CFF session, Dr. Forbat, assisted by UCO faculty members and students, will present pedagogically-relevant applications of digital keyboards for developing pianists at the collegiate or precollegiate level.

Kaye Shields Distinguished Teacher



Kaye Edwards Shields graduated "magna cum laude" from Oklahoma Baptist University in 1969 with a Bachelor of Music Education degree with emphasis in voice and a minor in piano. In 1973 she received a Master of Music degree from the University of Oklahoma, majoring in voice with secondary areas of concentration in piano and music history.

She inaugurated and developed the Preparatory Department at OBU in 1985, where she served as the department's director for thirteen years. She also taught piano and music theory two years through the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary Extension in Oklahoma City. In addition she taught piano improvisation at Southwestern Oklahoma State University's piano camp for three summer sessions. She was the first master teacher for Kamp Keyboard in Oklahoma City.

Mrs. Shields has been a member of OMTA since 1973 and has maintained a private piano and voice studio since that time. She has had one or more Senior Audition winners/finalists every year from 1973 to the present. Since its inception she has had a piano winner in the Senior Audition Finals two years as well as three voice winners. Each performed on the OMTA state conference senior high winners' concert. She served as Senior Audition Finals chair for one vear. She has had one or more recipients of the Clarence Burg Award every year since its beginning. Many of her students have been selected as Junior Audition winners for the past thirty years. Two of her voice students have advanced to the MTNA national voice finals, while three other voice students have advanced to the MTNA South Central Division high school voice audition. Mrs. Shields is an active adjudicator in Oklahoma and was a national judge at the 1998 MTNA high school voice audition. She was a presenter at the 1990 MTNA national convention, speaking on the topic of Music and the Preschool Child. She has served on the OMTA Executive Board as secretary for two years, Independent Music Teachers' Forum chair four years and Eastern Division Co-President two years. She was also Southeast District President two years. She has served as decorations

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chair for two OMTA state conferences. She was a founder of the Shawnee Area Music Teachers' Association (SAMTA) and served as president two years. In addition, she has held various offices in SAMTA.

Mrs. Shields has been a member of the National Piano Guild since 1973 and has had twelve students receive the Paderewski Medal. She served as local Guild chairman thirteen years. Fourteen of her students have been selected for the State of Oklahoma superintendent's Excellence in the Arts Award. She is a member Pi Kappa Lambda where she served as president of the OBU chapter for two years. She was president of the McAlester Arts and Humanities Council four years and was president of the Southeast Oklahoma District Federation of Music Clubs four years. She served as OBU's Friends of the Arts president two years. She also served as a member of OBU's Alumni Board of Directors. She was selected by the music faculty as OBU's Outstanding Music Alumna for 2008.

A church musician for many years, Mrs. Shields has served on the Oklahoma Hymn Festival board, has served as an adjudicator on both the district and state levels and has taught hymn expansion workshops throughout Oklahoma. Many of her students have been selected State Hymn Festival winners. She has directed children's choirs and ensembles and currently accompanies First Christian Church's Spiritsong. She is presently the church organist/pianist of First Christian Church, Shawnee, where she has served fourteen years. She has taught preschool music classes at First Christian Church and First Baptist Church. Her preschool teaching spans thirty-seven years.

Numerous former students chose music as a vocation, majoring in piano or voice. They now teach music in public and private schools. Many operate independent piano studios while others serve as professional accompanists or church musicians. One is singing on Broadway. Two are composers while another is studying to become a musicologist. Some presently teach on university faculties. Mrs. Shields currently teaches in her independent piano and voice studio, which she has maintained since 1973.

Randall and Nancy Faber Conference Clinicians




Nancy and Randall Faber have combined their backgrounds as composer and performer to become leading supporters of the piano teacher and student. The husband and wife team has authored over 200 publications, including the bestselling PreTime® to BigTime® Piano Supplementary Library and the acclaimed method Piano Adventures®.

Nancy Faber was named "Distinguished Composer of the Year" by the Music Teachers National Association for her award-winning composition *Tennessee Suite for Piano and String Quartet*. Her flute quartet, *Voices from Between Worlds*, was the winning composition for the 1994 National Flute Association's Professional Chamber Music Competition. Nancy Faber's music has been heard on network television and on public radio. Teachers of composition include Joan Tower, William Albright, and British composer Nicholas Maw; piano studies were at the Eastman School and Michigan State University.

Randall Faber has toured Korea, Taiwan, the United Kingdom, Australia, New Zealand, the United States and Canada. He was a master teacher for the World Conference on Piano Pedagogy, National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy, and the National Piano Teachers Institute. He gave recent recitals in Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, Perth, St. Louis, Ann Arbor, Dallas and Austin, with upcoming engagements at the Wasserman Festival, the Gilmore Festival and the Portland International Music Festival. Dr. Faber holds three degrees from the University of Michigan and a Ph.D. from Vanderbilt University. In 2005 he presented his academic research at the 9th International Conference on Motivation in Lisbon, Portugal.

The Fabers advocate piano study not only for personal expression and performance success, but also as a vehicle for the student's creative and cognitive development. Their philosophy is reflected in their writing, their public appearances, and in their own teaching.

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

In the past year, **Randall Faber** appeared at the Gilmore
Festival, the Wasserman Festival,
the Portland International Piano
Festival, the Korean Piano
Adventures Convention in Seoul,
and in a lecture-recital tour of
Southeast Asia. While in Korea,
Faber appeared on the popular
television show Heart-to-Heart,
which is broadcast in 188



countries, and his June solo recital in Chicago was broadcast live on WFMT public radio.

In recent seasons, Dr. Faber toured Australia, New Zealand, Taiwan, and the United Kingdom. He was a Convention Artist for this year's Music Teachers National Association Conference and has been a master teacher for the World Conference on Piano Pedagogy, National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy, and the National Piano Teachers Institute. He gave recent recitals in Seoul, Jakarta, Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, Perth, Chicago, St. Louis, Dallas, Austin, North Dakota, Wisconsin, and South Carolina and has presented as Visiting Artist at universities throughout North America and Asia.

Randall Faber holds three degrees from the University of Michigan and a Ph.D. in Education and Human Development from Vanderbilt University. In 2005, he presented his scholarly research at the 9th International Conference on Motivation in Lisbon, Portugal.

Randall and his wife Nancy are well known as authors of the best-selling Piano Adventures® teaching method and their many publications for the piano. They recently founded the Faber Piano Institute, which hosts their teacher support website www.PianoTeaching.com.

History of the Oklahoma Music Teachers Association

The Oklahoma Music Teachers Association was initially organized in 1913 but was discontinued in 1917 following the resignation of its president, Mrs. Dewitt Hunt of Stillwater, when her husband entered military service in the First World War.

In 1929 OMTA was reorganized following a meeting of the National Federation of Music Clubs in April of that year when a group of music teachers gathered in the Mayo Hotel in Tulsa to discuss an organization primarily for music teacher Clarence Burg of Oklahoma City was appointed Chairman of Planning.

Plans were presented to 30 music teachers on November 30, 1929, at Oklahoma City University. The newly written constitution and bylaws were adopted and the following officers were elected: President, Clarence Burg, Oklahoma City University; First Vice President, Albert Lukken, University of Tulsa; Second Vice President, Mrs. Lewis C. Lawson, Holdenville; Secretary, Marjorie Dwyer, Oklahoma College for Women, Chickasha; Treasurer, William H. Wehrend, University of Oklahoma, Norman; Publicity Chairman, C. B. Macklin, Central State Teachers College, Edmond; Historian, Ida Gardner, Tulsa.

The constitution stated the purpose of the association was to elevate the standards of music instruction in Oklahoma and establish a closer relationship among the music teachers of the state. Membership was to be granted to those approved by the Executive Board. The bylaws established annual conventions and divided the state into four districts formed by the Rock Island and Santa Fe railroads.

The first annual convention was held on April 10-11, 1930, at the Oklahoma College for Women in Chickasha in joint session with the Oklahoma Federation of Music Clubs. At the 1931 convention in Lawton, again held jointly with the Federation of Music Clubs, it was voted to hold future conventions separately from other organizations so the entire time could be devoted to problems of the music teaching profession and to programs of special interest to professional musicians.

It was also decided to publish quarterly an official journal with the first issue of the *Oklahoma Music Teacher* appearing December 20, 1931. An item in this issue mentioned that work was going well under the new plan of certifying private music teachers.

Beginning with the state convention in Tulsa, December, 1933, (guest artist, pianist Rudolph Reuter), OMTA established the policy of bringing a nationally known artist-teacher to each of its conventions.

In 1952 OMTA obtained affiliation with the Music Teachers National Association on a 50 percent basis. At the state convention on June 7, 1954, the membership voted to maintain 100 percent affiliation.

Effective with the convention in Norman in February, 1942, all active members of OMTA are required to be certified by OMTA. In 1967 a similar plan, but optional, was adopted by Music Teachers National Association (MTNA) with the additional requirement of renewal every five years. Effective since 1991, this same renewal process is required for state certification. The state convention program in Tulsa in April, 1943, included a concert performed by students selected from the four districts. The concert was so well received that annual district auditions were established to select students to appear on every state convention program. Thus, the Senior Auditions were born. In 1946 similar auditions for younger students, Junior Auditions, were established with those selected performing at their district conventions.

To encourage teachers to include more theory in the applied music lesson, it was agreed in 1954 to require entrants in the Junior and Senior Auditions to pass a written theory examination in order to be declared a winner. Also in 1954, the OMTA Collegiate Artist Auditions were started with the first winners performing on the state convention program in Tulsa in March, 1955. In 1990 the Junior Honor Competition for fifth and sixth grade students of MTNA certified teachers was added.

Because all OMTA auditions were competitive, a committee planned the first OMTA Achievement Auditions. In March, 1969, students of piano, voice, and orchestral instruments were entered in area auditions. Those receiving top ratings went on to the state audition in Norman on March 29, 1969. Originally open to only junior high and senior high school students, in 1979 the Achievement Auditions were opened to elementary students. In 1995 administration of the theory tests was changed to the State Auditions. In 2000,

administration of the theory tests was changed to the District Achievement Auditions in order for more students to be able to participate.

In March, 1953, OMTA was host to the first convention of the Southwestern Division of MTNA, which included Arkansas, Colorado, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Texas. Division lines were later changed and Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, and Texas became the South Central Division.

Through the years many OMTA members have been selected to serve the national association on boards and committees. In1969 Celia Mae Bryant of the University of Oklahoma was elected the first woman president of MTNA.

OMTA has continued to grow as an organization. In 1987 the first computers were purchased for OMTA officers. In 1988 OMTA became incorporated. In 1992 a complete revision of the constitution and bylaws added the president of each local association to the Executive Board. OMTA established its first internet web page in 1999. In 2001, OMTA awarded its first Distinguished Teacher Award to Dr. Digby Bell, Professor Emeritus of the University of Oklahoma. The OMTA 2002 Distinguished Teacher Award was posthumously presented to Elwyn Ratliff, long-time Tulsa piano teacher who died in February, 2002. The 2003 Distinguished Teacher Award was presented to Dr. Jane Magrath, Professor of Music, University of Oklahoma.

In March 2004, OMTA was saddened by the passing of past President and Distinguished OMTA Teacher, Dr. Digby Bell. Digby was one of MTNA's first Foundation Fellows and a valuable member and officer in the history of OMTA. Later in March at the MTNA National Conference in Kansas City, Honorary OMTA Member and Past President Auda Marie Thomas was awarded an MTNA Foundation Fellow by the members of OMTA. 2004 marked the 75th Anniversary of OMTA as a state organization. A huge celebration took place at the state conference in June held at the Adam's Mark Hotel in downtown Tulsa. MTNA President Phyllis Pieffer was in attendance to present OMTA with a commemorative plaque acknowledging 50 years as an affiliate with MTNA. During the conference, Dr. Ed Gates from the University of Oklahoma was presented with the 2004 Distinguished Teacher of the Year. During the business meeting, the membership voted to accept



her home and studio, where they still live today with two of their three children. Kathy has served in various capacities






