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

# Anne Epperson Conference Clinician



Pianist **Anne Epperson** enjoys a distinguished career as a performer, recording artist, teacher and clinician. She made her debut at age twelve with the New Orleans Philharmonic under Alexander Hilsberg. After studies at Louisiana State University and the Juilliard

School, she entered graduate school at the University of Southern California and was appointed staff pianist for the master classes of Jascha Heifetz. This auspicious beginning led to a successful career as a collaborative partner. Ms. Epperson has appeared in concert with distinguished artists throughout the United States, Canada, South America, Mexico, Europe, Israel, Scandinavia, Taiwan and Korea. Critics have praised her collaborative artistry: New York Times "...an excellent partner...technical ability and musicality admirably displayed..."; Seattle Times "...extraordinarily sensitive and well-realized work...a gifted accompanist..."; Los Angeles Times "...eloquent support..."; Cleveland Plain Dealer "...Epperson is a chamber music pianist with few peers...". From 1980 to 1989 she toured the U.S. as pianist with the Canterbury Trio, under the auspices of Columbia Artists Management, Inc. She has recorded for Vanguard, Musical Heritage Society, Nonesuch, Centaur, Koch International, and Claves and has produced and edited recordings for Nonesuch and Azica. Her career as an educator is equally impressive. In the fall of 2008 she inaugurated and now heads the new Collaborative Piano Department at The University of Texas at Austin's Butler School of Music. From 2004 to 2008 she was Professor of Collaborative Piano at the University of Colorado at Boulder's College of Music, where she created and developed a new graduate degree program. She was Professor of Music



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

and Director of Collaborative Arts at the University of California – Santa Barbara from 2001 to 2004 and from 1985 to 2001 she was head of the Collaborative Piano Department at the Cleveland Institute Music. Previous faculty positions include teaching appointments at the University of Illinois and the North Carolina School of the Arts. She has been juror for many prestigious competitions, including the Walter W. Naumburg Foundation competitions, the Fischoff Chamber Music competition, the Coleman Chamber Music competition, the Plowman Chamber Music Competition, the New Orleans International Piano Competition, the Corpus Christi International Young Artists Competition, and the Los Angeles Music Center Spotlight Awards. Ms. Epperson has been a panelist, lecturer, performer and master class presenter for the Music Teachers National Association, National Conference on Piano Pedagogy, the Colorado Music Teachers Association, the Indiana Music Teachers Association, the South Carolina Music Teachers Association, and the Vocal Arts Resource Network in Ohio. She is active as a consultant and advisor in the development of collaborative piano programs nationally and internationally. Anne Epperson was on the faculty of the Music Academy of the West in Santa Barbara from 1992 to 2006, performing, and administering teaching. collaborative piano program she designed. Since the summer of 2007, she has been a member of the artist faculty at the Colorado College Summer Music Festival in Colorado Springs. She has been a guest performer and coach at the Sarasota Music Festival, the International Festival – Institute at Round Top, the Garth Newel Summer Festival, the Taos Chamber Music Festival, the Scotia Festival, Chamber Music Northwest, the Meadowmount School for Strings, and the Aspen Music Festival, among others.

# Fred Karpoff Conference Clinician




**Fred Karpoff** is the artistic producer of *The 3-D Piano Method* and 2011 Winner of the Frances Clark Keyboard Pedagogy Award presented by MTNA. Produced with film-maker Richard Breyer, *The 3-D Piano: The Three-Dimensional Pianist,* is a multi-DVD series and book on a whole-body approach to piano playing and teaching, already

in use in over 20 countries around the world. He presents workshops and master classes throughout North America, including recent appearances at the Music Teachers Association of California, Texas Music Teachers Association Conventions, and the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy.

He received his undergraduate training at Northwestern University and studied with Ann Schein, Yoheved Kaplinsky, and Robert Weirich, and holds the Doctor of Musical Arts from the Peabody Conservatory, where he performed in the master classes of Leon Fleisher. He has also worked with Jeffrey Kahane, Richard Goode, and the late Karl-Ulrich Schnabel and is the pianist of the Boccaccio Trio.

He is Professor of Piano and Ensemble Arts and co-chair of the keyboard department at the Setnor School of Music at Syracuse University, which has honored him with the Excellence in Graduate Education Faculty Recognition Award.

A former Artistic Ambassador for the United States Information Agency, Fred Karpoff is a prize winner in the San Antonio, Frinna Awerbuch, Dublin, and 2005 Competition Internationale international piano competitions. In addition to his critically acclaimed CD release, *Heroic Tales: Piano Music of Edward MacDowell*, also released are his live Beethoven Trio performances with musicians at the Skaneateles Festival and This Moment and Snapshots with soprano Rebecca Karpoff. He is an acclaimed pianist with performances in 12 countries and presents workshops and master classes at universities, music teachers' associations, and conventions throughout the United States. As guest artist at major music festivals in the U.S. and Europe, he has collaborated with many of America's foremost musicians.

# Brad Richter Commissioned Composer/Clinician

**Brad Richter** (b. 1969, Enid OK) began teaching himself to play guitar and compose at age 12. At 19, having had no formal musical training, he was awarded the Presidential Scholarship to the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago where he studied with guitarist Paul Henry and began performing, composing, and eventually teaching professionally. After completing his undergraduate degrees in performance and composition, Brad accepted a scholarship to the Royal College of Music in London where he studied with Carlos Bonell. He became the first guitarist in the college's history to win the coveted Thomas Morherr Prize for voice accompaniment, and went on to win the Royal College of Music's guitar competition before completing his Master's degree and returning to the US to continue his concert career.

Brad has performed around the globe as a soloist, with renowned chamber ensembles, and in duos with artists such as David Finckel. His concerts and those of The Richter Uzur Duo (with cellist Viktor Uzur) are featured frequently on national NPR and PBS broadcasts. Festival appearances include The Aspen Music Festival, The World Youth Guitar Festival, The Guitar Festival of Great Britain, The London International Guitar Festival, Festival Dr. Alfonso Ortiz Tirado (Mexico) and the Walnut Valley Festival, where he won the National Fingerpicking Championship in 1999, a competition that features some of the world's finest guitarists from all genres.

In addition to his collections of concert music for solo guitar, Brad is an avid composer of his own particular brand of chamber music - combining genres such as world music, Native American music, pop, and classical.

While at home in Tucson, Brad focuses on his work as Artistic Director of Lead Guitar, a not-for-profit he co-founded in 2006 that establishes guitar programs in schools around the U.S. with large populations of at-risk youth. In 2011-12 the programs are teaching more than 1,150 kids to play the guitar and training more than 50 school teachers to teach guitar.



# Gloria N. Johnson Distinguished Teacher



Gloria N. Johnson's musical dream began at the age of 5 through the enthusiastic vision of her parents who sacrificed during World War II to invest in a new Baldwin piano. At the young age of 10, she continued her training with Aline Weir Wilson, professor of piano at

Phillips University in Enid, Oklahoma. This training led to a scholarship and study with Kenneth Smith, Artist in Residence at Phillips University.

Her collegiate pursuit continued at Tulsa University with Dorothy Gideon, where she completed her junior and senior recitals as well as maintained an active role as accompanist for instrumentalists and vocalists.

After finishing at Tulsa University, Gloria continued her professional training through the International Workshops where she received handson experience with Nelita True, Jean Barr, Tony Caramia, Marvin Blinkenstaff, and others. The Francis Clark workshops proved to be a monumental endeavor in her teaching field. She feels privileged to have had these opportunities.

Some of the most memorable experiences were the several trips to Princeton, New Jersey, while her students participated in the Westminster Choir College piano camp under the direction of Ingrid Clarfield, followed by a reward to New York City for a Broadway Musical. She had the opportunity to meet and visit extensively with MTNA's President Ben Caton as she accompanied one of her students to Lee University in Cleveland, Tennessee, for their annual summer competition, which draws students from the

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East and West Coasts as well as the Midwest. Her student was a finalist in the event and was one of the youngest to compete (ninth grade).

Gloria has taught piano for 50 years with a rewarding record of success. She has had winners in the State MTNA Junior and senior piano performance category and an alternate at the Division competition held at SMU for Senior Piano Performance. She has had several Marilyn Witcher Honor Competition winners and numerous Junior and Senior Competition winners. Her passion is the assurance that students of all teachers be as successful and be given as many opportunities as possible.

She has been a member of MTNA since 1970 serving two terms as president of her local association, Tulsa Accredited Music Teachers, as well as program chair and various behind the scenes duties. On the state level, she has served as Independent Music Teacher Forum chair and presently serves as Vice President of Auditions and Competitions. Gloria is Junior Performance Coordinator for the MTNA South-Central Division which she has held for 11 years. One of her highlights was serving on the MTNA nominating committee when her nominee, Ann Gipson, was elected as President.

Music and her students are the fulfillment of her life, and she feels privileged to belong to many local music performing organizations.

Melissa Johansen began her piano study in 1980 with Linda Wiles. During her pre-college years, she won many competitions throughout the southwest including Padewerski Guild Medal. National Guild High

School Diploma, and various awards through the Arizona Music Teachers Association. She earned a Bachelor of Music Education Degree from Oklahoma Baptist University in 1998. While attending OBU, Melissa studied under Sandra Meyer and Dr. Carol Bell, served as the accompanist for the Bison Glee Club, and was an accompanist for vocalists and instrumentalists.

Melissa taught K-6 music for 5 years at Westfall Elementary in Choctaw, OK. 



BROKEN ARROW—Phyllis Welk has taught private piano lessons in Broken Arrow for the past 34 years. She became an active member of Broken Arrow Music Teachers Association in 1980, then joined OMTA and MTNA in 1986 and was a charter member of the OMT Broken Arrow Association where she has

served in several offices including Junior Auditions and District Chair. Mrs. Welk was educated at Baylor University where she received a BME in voice/piano in 1970 and taught elementary music in Moore, Oklahoma, after graduating. She currently serves OMTA as President of the Broken Arrow Association and Vice President of Local Associations. She also has served as an adjudicator for various auditions and competitions over the past 20 years.



# History of the Oklahoma Music Teachers Association

The Oklahoma Music Teachers Association was initially organized in 1913 but was discontinued in 1917 following the resignation of its president, Mrs. Dewitt Hunt of Stillwater, when her husband entered military service in the First World War.

In 1929 OMTA was reorganized following a meeting of the National Federation of Music Clubs in April of that year when a group of music teachers gathered in the Mayo Hotel in Tulsa to discuss an organization primarily for music teacher Clarence Burg of Oklahoma City was appointed Chairman of Planning.

Plans were presented to 30 music teachers on November 30, 1929, at Oklahoma City University. The newly written constitution and bylaws were adopted and the following officers were elected: President, Clarence Burg, Oklahoma City University; First Vice President, Albert Lukken, University of Tulsa; Second Vice President, Mrs. Lewis C. Lawson, Holdenville; Secretary, Marjorie Dwyer, Oklahoma College for Women, Chickasha; Treasurer, William H. Wehrend, University of Oklahoma, Norman; Publicity Chairman, C. B. Macklin, Central State Teachers College, Edmond; Historian, Ida Gardner, Tulsa.

The constitution stated the purpose of the association was to elevate the standards of music instruction in Oklahoma and establish a closer relationship among the music teachers of the state. Membership was to be granted to those approved by the Executive Board. The bylaws established annual conventions and divided the state into four districts formed by the Rock Island and Santa Fe railroads.

The first annual convention was held on April 10-11, 1930, at the Oklahoma College for Women in Chickasha in joint session with the Oklahoma Federation of Music Clubs. At the 1931 convention in Lawton, again held jointly with the Federation of Music Clubs, it was voted to hold future conventions separately from other organizations so the entire time could be devoted to problems of the music teaching profession and to programs of special interest to professional musicians.

It was also decided to publish quarterly an official journal with the first issue of the *Oklahoma Music Teacher* appearing December 20, 1931. An item in this issue mentioned that work was going well under the new plan of certifying private music teachers.

Beginning with the state convention in Tulsa, December, 1933, (guest artist, pianist Rudolph Reuter), OMTA established the policy of bringing a nationally known artist-teacher to each of its conventions.

In 1952 OMTA obtained affiliation with the Music Teachers National Association on a 50 percent basis. At the state convention on June 7, 1954, the membership voted to maintain 100 percent affiliation.

Effective with the convention in Norman in February, 1942, all active members of OMTA are required to be certified by OMTA. In 1967 a similar plan, but optional, was adopted by Music Teachers National Association (MTNA) with the additional requirement of renewal every five years. Effective since 1991, this same renewal process is required for state certification. The state convention program in Tulsa in April, 1943, included a concert performed by students selected from the four districts. The concert was so well received that annual district auditions were established to select students to appear on every state convention program. Thus, the Senior Auditions were born. In 1946 similar auditions for younger students, Junior Auditions, were established with those selected performing at their district conventions.

To encourage teachers to include more theory in the applied music lesson, it was agreed in 1954 to require entrants in the Junior and Senior Auditions to pass a written theory examination in order to be declared a winner. Also in 1954, the OMTA Collegiate Artist Auditions were started with the first winners performing on the state convention program in Tulsa in March, 1955. In 1990 the Junior Honor Competition for fifth and sixth grade students of MTNA certified teachers was added.

Because all OMTA auditions were competitive, a committee planned the first OMTA Achievement Auditions. In March, 1969, students of piano, voice, and orchestral instruments were entered in area auditions. Those receiving top ratings went on to the state audition in Norman on March 29, 1969. Originally open to only junior high and senior high school students, in 1979 the Achievement Auditions were opened to elementary students. In 1995 administration of the theory tests was changed to the State Auditions. In 2000, administration of the theory tests was changed to the District Achievement Auditions in order for more students to be able to participate.

In March, 1953, OMTA was host to the first convention of the Southwestern Division of MTNA, which included Arkansas, Colorado, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Texas. Division lines were later changed and Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, and Texas became the South Central Division. *(continued on p. 20)* 


# History of the Oklahoma Music Teachers Association (continued)

Through the years many OMTA members have been selected to serve the national association on boards and committees. In 1969 Celia Mae Bryant of the University of Oklahoma was elected the first woman president of MTNA.

OMTA has continued to grow as an organization. In 1987 the first computers were purchased for OMTA officers. In 1988 OMTA became incorporated. In 1992 a complete revision of the constitution and bylaws added the president of each local association to the Executive Board. OMTA established its first internet web page in 1999. In 2001, OMTA awarded its first Distinguished Teacher Award to Dr. Digby Bell, Professor Emeritus of the University of Oklahoma. The OMTA 2002 Distinguished Teacher Award was posthumously presented to Elwyn Ratliff, long-time Tulsa piano teacher who died in February, 2002. The 2003 Distinguished Teacher Award was presented to Dr. Jane Magrath, Professor of Music, University of Oklahoma.

In March 2004, OMTA was saddened by the passing of past President and Distinguished OMTA Teacher, Dr. Digby Bell. Digby was one of MTNA's first Foundation Fellows and a valuable member and officer in the history of OMTA. Later in March at the MTNA National Conference in Kansas City, Honorary OMTA Member and Past President Auda Marie Thomas was awarded an MTNA Foundation Fellow by the members of OMTA. 2004 marked the 75th Anniversary of OMTA as a state organization. A huge celebration took place at the state conference in June held at the Adam's Mark Hotel in downtown Tulsa. MTNA President Phyllis Pieffer was in attendance to present OMTA with a commemorative plaque acknowledging 50 years as an affiliate with MTNA. During the conference, Dr. Ed Gates from the University of Oklahoma was presented with the 2004 Distinguished Teacher of the Year. During the business meeting, the membership voted to accept the redistricting of the state from four to two districts: East and West.

In 2009 OMTA celebrated its 80th anniversary at the Hilton Tulsa Southern Hills Hotel. The closing session featured a special "Eight-Tea" and honored our past state presidents, including MTNA National President Ann Gipson, the featured speaker at the banquet the preceding evening. We mourned the loss of past state president Jim Breckenridge, who did so much to further the cause of OMTA. 2010 was noteworthy as we were able for the first time to honor two OMTA members, Skye Garcia and Sylvia Ryan, as MTNA Foundation Fellows at the MTNA Conference in Albuquerque.


