From the Beginning

Start with the Body, Part 1 of 2

If the body is the first instrument, it makes sense to start there when learning or creating music. When we can express a musical idea physically (by moving, chanting or singing) we prove that we own the concept and are able to get it out of our brain and into our body. We are then ready to put the music onto an instrument. Elements of music such as rhythm, melody, harmony and expression can all be conveyed first with the body. Norman Area MTA Announce Fall Festival

All OMTA members are invited to enter the NAMTA Fall Festival which will be held on Saturday, October 28th at OU's Catlett Music Center. The festival provides a wide variety of performance opportunities for all students, including New Beginner, Non-memory and Memory divisions for one or two solos. There is also an ensemble division for students or non-teacher performers. (However, teachers may accompany their students in instrumental or vocal categories.) There is no minimum length of study requirement nor minimum number of measures in the New Beginner Division. Students are welcome to perform in costume and play Halloween music although any style of repertoire is accepted. Postmark deadline is Saturday, September 30, 2023.

This annual event provides an opportunity for students to perform and receive constructive comments as well as ribbons (memory and ensemble divisions only) and decorative stickers. NAMTA also presents a \$50 Senior Award to H.S. students who have participated in the Solo/Ens. Divisions all 4 years! The annual event is a great way to celebrate fall traditions and provide students with a fun performance opportunity midway through the fall semester. Ingrid Jacobson Clarfield, Professor and Head of the Piano Division at Westminster Choir College of Rider University, is a nationally recognized performer, clinician and author. She has presented workshops, lecturerecitals and master classes in over 150 cities in 40 states across North America, including many presentations at State and National MTNA Conferences and other prestigious conferences and festivals. Professor Clarfield has written 25 books and is the subject of a documentary entitled: *Take a Bow: the Ingrid Clarfield Story*.

Top 10 Tips for Teaching Students How to Enjoy Practicing and Make it Creative, Efficient and Fun!!! Professor Clarfield will share her Top 10 Tips for making practice efficient, artistic, and FUN. Both new and veteran teachers will leave this session with ideas for teaching students how to maximize their results and enjoy the process. The session will include examples from Early Intermediate through Advanced repertoire. Whether it's Fur Elise or the "Waldstein" Sonata, these practice strategies will help students solve problems to play the music they love! This session will address the different ways practice changes over the course of study, from the first week a piece is assigned to the final weeks leading up to a performance. We'll look at how to design charts to develop tempo consistency and control, as well as ideas on Rubato. Specific strategies to secure memorization will also be addressed. There will be something in this presentation for every student, whether they are preparing for their yearly studio recital or for a competition at the national level. The session will include a variety of musical examples from Early Intermediate through Advanced repertoire. "PRACTICE MAKES PERMANENT", so let's make sure you and your students are practicing correctly to achieve technical and musical security, and enjoying it too!!

The Road to Chopin: From Method Book to First Chopin Pieces

Your student is dying to play the Minute Waltz or Nocturne in Eb Major, but they're still in Book 3 of their method book! How will you get them there? This workshop will provide teachers with an extensive list of repertoire that will help students prepare for the technical and musical challenges they will encounter in the easiest works of Chopin. Professor Clarfield will give teachers numerous practical suggestions for HOW to apply the musical and technical elements found in this preparatory repertoire to Chopin's easier compositions. Specific technical exercises will also be shown how to introduce students at an early level to the voicing and pedaling they will need to play Chopin artistically. Teachers will learn lots of new ideas on repertoire and a clear musical and technical direction of the road their students need to take to go from method book to their first work of Chopin.

Marilyn Witcher Jr. Honor Competition Changes

Back in the late 1990's, OMTA Past President Marilyn Witcher established a Jr. Honor Competition for 5th and 6th graders to prepare promising students for the level of repertoire required for the MTNA Jr. Competitions for 7th and 8th graders. Marilyn was a proponent of high standards and encouraged all teachers to become nationally certified, which MTNA recognizes as NCTMs: Nationally Certified Teachers of Music.

In order to be compliant with MTNA's trade restrictions, OMTA had to remove Marilyn's requirement of limiting this competition to students of NCTM teachers. However, all other rules remain the same for 5th or 6th grade entrants: Pianists must perform works representing at least 2 of the 3 style periods by memory with a minimum performance time of 8 minutes but not to exceed 15 minutes. The same rules apply to instrumental entrants although there is no memory requirement.

This year's competition takes place on the same day as the Sr. Competitions: Saturday, April 20th at Gilliam Music Store in Norman. The winner will be mailed a \$75 monetary award along with an invite to perform on one of the Winners Recitals at the OMTA State Conference in Norman. Note: Any teachers that are NCTM and have competition winners performing on the recitals at the state conference will be recognized in the program.
